3. Justification in the curriculum, relation to other subjects and to the profession

Sociocommunitarian Occupational Therapy has gained enormous relevance in recent years given the growing demand for intervention with groups of disadvantaged people with marked occupational dysfunction. In this way, occupational therapists are gradually expanding the areas in which they develop their intervention, their praxis is no longer based only in the institutional field but that work in the community is ceasing to be something strange to become more and more common. Through this subject, it is proposed that the students be able to put into practice the process of Occupational Therapy in the community environment and with groups in a situation of social exclusion or at risk of it. This requires the learning of a series of knowledge, skills and tools that allow the design, implementation and evaluation of effective, efficient and effective interventions. Likewise, the acquisition of attitudes related to intervention at the community level will be of special relevance.
